




STAFFING

Officer Dean was promoted to sergeant in September 2016. Officer Dean served in an assignment in the investigative unit and is a crisis negotiator. He served seventeen (17) years as a Patrolman prior to his promotion to Sergeant.

Two patrolmen, one sergeant and a dispatcher retired. Two (2) patrol officers and two (2) dispatchers were hired to fill vacancies. All new employees completed field training.



SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

Maumee Police continue to staff a school resource officer at the Maumee High School and another officer at Gateway Middle School. The school resource officer assists with school discipline, truancy issues and campus security. In addition, the officer builds relationships with the students, educators, administration and provides various topical lessons in the classroom.

BUSINESS VISITS

The Maumee Police Chief along with the Maumee Fire Chief and Safety Director made weekly community visits to citywide small business and large corporations. It was valuable to foster relationships and foster a networking environment with the Maumee business community.



Year in review ohio collaborative certification

The Police Division was certified with the Ohio Collaborative Advisory Board of the Ohio Criminal Justice Services. The Division met the standards for policy and practice in the areas of Use of Force, Training, Recruitment and Hiring Standards. We consider this a benchmark knowing we have a body of policies and standards that meet or exceed the professional best practices in the policing service.

CITIZEN POLICE ACADEMY

The Police Division continues to support our Citizen Police Academy volunteers. We graduated a class of forty (40) citizens from our ten week academy in the fall of 2016. Citizen Police Academy graduates contributed 150 hours of volunteer time to various police supported functions. Examples of their efforts include the annual fireworks display, the Maumee Uptown Summer Fair and the Holiday Light parade.



LUCAS COUNTY OVI TASK FORCE

The City of Maumee received \$13,188 of federal grant funding for MPD's participation in the Lucas County OVITF during 2016. The grant includes repayment of direct labor costs, fringe benefits and transportation / fuel costs. Officers worked two hundred twenty seven (227) hours of traffic enforcement, making three hundred forty two (342) traffic stops and issued two hundred seventy six (276) traffic citations.

MPD facilitated an OVI Checkpoint in August 2016. The event was staffed by members of the Maumee Police Division and the Sylvania Twp. Police Department. A total of eight hundred thirty five (835) vehicles traveled thru the checkpoint. Four hundred eighty three (483) of those vehicles were checked by officers. Twenty nine (29) vehicles were diverted for further investigation. Arrests / citations include: four (4) warrant arrests, eight (8) suspended operators licenses, one (1) child safety restraint, one (1) open container of alcohol and one (1) possession of marijuana.



MPD OVI ARRESTS

The Police Division made one hundred five (105) OVI arrests during 2016. Males comprised seventy three percent (73%) of the arrests. Females comprised twenty seven percent (27%) of the arrests. Thirty-six percent (36%) refused a breath / blood test while sixty four percent (64%) submitted to the requested chemical test. Seventy three percent (73%) was the result of a traffic stop. Twenty-seven percent (27%) of the arrests involved a traffic crash.

COLLEGE INTERNSHIPS

The Police Division facilitated four college internships for area students. Mr. Adam B. Ginier completed a one hundred twenty (120) hour internship. He is a junior at the University of Toledo. Ms. Kayla Fox, a senior at Michigan State University completed her one hundred twenty (120) hour internship and graduated with a Bachelor of Art degree in Criminal Justice degree in December. Ms. Erica Tullis, a Maumee resident and a junior at the University of Toledo, completed a two hundred (200) hour internship. Maumee resident, Ms. Elizabeth Theaker, completed a one hundred twenty (120) hour internship. She was our first intern student from Lourdes University.

Accidents

The number of accidents at the most hazardous intersection increased from 42in 2015 to 63 in 2016. The total number of accidents in the 10 most hazardous intersections also increased, from 227 in 2015, to 262 in 2016. There is a tie for sixth place.

Three intersections dropped from the list this year: the Anthony Wayne Trail and S Detroit, W Dussel and Holland and the Anthony Wayne Trail and Monclova.

There was one fatal accident for 2016.



THE "ARE YOU OK?" PROGRAM

- For twenty-seven years, the Maumee Police Division has operated the "Are You O.K.?" program. Known as R.U.O.K., the program continues to check the safety of our senior citizens as well as our hotel night clerks and gas station attendants. Each participant receives a daily or nightly call checking on his or her safety. A police crew is sent to check their safety if there is no answer.
- The program has helped many residents since its inception. The program then expanded to check the safety of 24-hour gas station employees and hotel desk clerks. The program currently has nine individual subscribers, along with ten hotels and four gas stations.
- Further, in 2016, a new program for Senior Citizens called the "Senior Outreach" program was created. This program involves a weekly in-person check (in the home) by a uniformed officer to ensure the needs of the senior are being met. There are currently seven senior residents utilizing the program.



CHILD SAFETY SEAT CHECKS

The Maumee Police Division has two officers that are certified technicians in child passenger restraints. They are certified through Safe Kids Coalition, Child Passenger Safety Training Program. This training enables the Maumee Police Division to provide our community with highly trained experts in the proper installation and implementation of child car seats.

In 2016, twenty-three child safety seat checks were performed for citizens working or living within the City of Maumee.

SEATBELT SAFETY

The Crime Prevention Officer taught the Third Grade Safety Belt Program to all thirdgrade students in the Maumee School District. One hundred and sixty-six students received practical training in the Ohio Department of Public Safety education program. The program encompassed the proper use of seat belts, statistics about accidents/seatbelt usage, and information on air bags. Each child received material and information to share with their family members. As part of the program, each student was deputized as Seat Belt Deputies as they pledged to wear their seatbelts and to remind family members to wear their seatbelts as well.



The City of Maumee Safety City program celebrated its 37th year in 2016. Eighty children participated in the summer program to help prepare four and five year olds to safely attend Kindergarten. Safety City consisted of classroom instruction, crafts, songs, and practical exercises in vehicle and pedestrian safety. Lessons were conducted on our miniature Safety City equipped with streets, crosswalks, traffic signals, railroad tracks, and faux buildings. Safety City consisted of 2 sessions per day over a two week period in June. The sessions lasted 2-1/2 hours each day.

The staff included three Maumee Police Officers, two teachers, and 14 high school and middle school student volunteers. Safety City is located at Wayne Trail Elementary School.

The Maumee Police Division and the Maumee Board of Education sponsor the Safety City program.

McDonald's Restaurant (Conant Street) and the Maumee Municipal Court support the program through donated products and services. St. Luke's Hospital Auxiliary provides each graduate of Maumee Safety City with a bicycle safety helmet. They also receive a t-shirt from the Maumee Police Division.



THE D.A.R.E. PROGRAM

The DARE program provides the students with the tools necessary to make the right decisions when it comes to alcohol, tobacco, other drugs, and violence. It is taught at Wayne Trail Elementary School, Gateway Middle School, and St. Joseph's Maumee School. The DARE program was taught to four-hundred and twenty students in the fifth and seventh grades this year.

The fifth grade program culminated with two separate graduation ceremonies. The first DARE graduation took place at the Maumee High School Performing Arts Center with the fifth-grade students of Wayne Trail Elementary. The second event occurred at St. Joseph's School Maumee.

The Maumee DARE officer also had a booth at the Maumee Uptown Fair. Many of the area DARE students attended this event along with DARE night at Ohio Skate, which provided an opportunity to reinforce the DARE drug-free choice.

Charlie's Dodge continues to kindly provide the Maumee DARE program with a donated vehicle with graphics.

The Maumee Police Division received a grant for the 2015-2016 school year from the Ohio Attorney General's Office. The awarded amount of \$17,437.60 helps to defer the cost of teaching the DARE program in the Maumee school system.



BIKE SAFETY

Bike safety/education is an important part of the Maumee crime prevention program. A bike rodeo was held at Fairfield Park in May 2016. Sixty-seven children participated in the rodeo free of charge. Maumee Police Division Bike Officers, Citizen Police Academy Volunteers, Safe Kids volunteers, as well as volunteers from TAB (Toledo Area Bicyclists) assisted the crime prevention staff by inspecting each bike, conducting safety checks and making repair recommendations. Cyclists participated in an agility course to test their skills.

Those who attended received a safety packet and bicycle helmets were given away free of charge to any cyclist who needed a helmet.

The Maumee Police Division participated in the Maumee Municipal Court's "Bike Helmet Reward" Program. The Maumee Court, under the leadership of Judge Gary Byers, supplied area police officers with coupons. When the officers observed children wearing bike helmets, they provided them with the coupon good for a free ice cream cone. These coupons have helped to increase the use of bike helmets by cyclists, skateboarders, and even those on rollerblades.

The Maumee Police Division continues to provide bike licenses free of charge. A licensed bike enables an owner to be identified and the bike returned when found or recovered.

Overview

The Police Division continues the tradition of training our officers to be the very best in the area.

1) 2016 saw another increase in the total number of training hours officers received over the previous year. The total number of training hours has more than doubled in the last 4 years, all with a reduced budget.

2) We hired 4 new Patrol Officers, each went through an extensive 20-week Field Training Program.

3) We also hired and trained 2 new part-time dispatchers.

4) The Police Division continues to commit an officer to the Northwest Ohio Bomb Squad, holding monthly training. We also serve as storage site for the team's equipment.

5) The Division assigned 2 new detectives, who went through investigator training.

6) We continue our commitment to train every officer in Crisis Intervention.

7) The entire Patrol staff participated in annual Use Of Force training.

8) We held annual firearms qualifications in several weapon platforms.

9) One half of the entire Division went through semi-annual First Aid training.

10) We hosted area-wide training in Death Notification and Advanced DUI Detection.

Major Investigations

Drugs

In June, Detectives responded to a Rail Repair facility regarding a suspicious property condition. It was discovered that a rail car had been altered to conceal contraband. Inside a hidden compartment, 8 bundles of marijuana were located and seized totaling 17.74 pounds. The investigation revealed the rail car tracking history included recent whereabouts in Mexico. Due to this, the investigation was turned over to the Drug Enforcement Administration (DEA). The estimated street value of the seizure was \$64,150.00.

Sex Crime

Prostitution sting as part of Operation Metro Shield (county-wide targeted enforcement effort) was conducted by Maumee Detectives at a local motel on 10/14/16. As a result, 2 individuals were charged with drug and sex-related offenses.

Rape

There were nine (9) reported cases of Rape investigated by the Detective Bureau. Two (2) cases resulted in the arrest and conviction of the suspects. One (1) case was referred to the Monroe County Sheriff's Office, after investigation revealed that it had occurred in their jurisdiction. Three (3) cases were closed due to lack of cooperation from the alleged victim. One (1) case was denied prosecution due to a lack of evidence and two (2) cases were determined to be unfounded.



Sexual Assault

There were four (4) Sexual Assault cases investigated by the Detective Bureau. Three (3) cases were closed due to lack of cooperation by the alleged victims. One (1) case was closed after investigative leads had been exhausted.

Missing Persons

Three (3) Missing Persons case was assigned for investigation by the Detective Bureau. All subjects reported missing were located.

Robbery

There were four (4) Robbery cases assigned to for investigation by the Detective Bureau. One (1) case resulted in the arrest and conviction of a suspect who brandished a knife while committing a theft offense at a business. Two (2) cases were closed due to the victim(s) failing to cooperate with the investigation. One (1) case is still under investigation as Detectives are actively working to identify the suspect from DNA evidence that was collected.



Residential Burglary

Twenty-one (21) Residential Burglary cases were assigned for investigation by the Detective Bureau. Four (4) cases were cleared by arrest, nine (9) cases were closed after all investigative leads had been exhausted and six (6) cases were closed due to a lack of leads. One (1) case was determined unfounded. One (1) case remains under investigation due to pending lab analysis results of evidence collected.

Breaking and Entering

Seven (7) Breaking and Entering cases were assigned for investigation by the Detective Bureau. Two (2) cases were cleared by arrest, one of which was due to the collection and identification of the suspect's DNA. Three (3) cases were closed due to lack of investigative leads, and the remaining two (2) cases were closed after all investigative leads had been exhausted.

Theft

184 Theft cases were assigned for investigation by the Detective Bureau. Of these, seventy-five (75) cases were cleared, fifty-seven (57) by arrest. Ten (10) cases are currently under investigation. The remaining ninety-nine (99) cases were closed due to either a lack of investigative leads or exhaustion of investigative leads.



Fraud


Forty-five (45) Fraud cases were assigned for investigation by the Detective Bureau. Of these, twenty (20) cases were cleared. Three (3) cases are currently under investigation, and the remaining twenty-two (22) cases were closed due to either a lack of investigative leads or exhaustion of investigative leads.

Summary

In 2016, investigations by the Detective Bureau resulted in the seizure of illegal drugs, with an estimated street value in excess of \$64,150.00. For the year, the Detective Bureau had 348 cases assigned for investigation. Of those, 28 remain under investigation. Of the remaining 320 closed cases, 168 were cleared (52.5%) and 152 were closed due to lack or exhaustion of investigative leads (47.5%). The majority of cases assigned to the Detective Bureau were theft related (184) which totaled 53% of all criminal investigations for the year.

Maumee High School Resource Officer

The SRO wrote (26) incident reports with (24) arrests during the 2016 school year at Maumee High School and also received investigations from the road patrol and detective bureau for possible follow-up and all incidents that involved Maumee students were included in this summary. Maumee High School SRO also documented three incidents of students in mental crisis and assisted on two Maumee Fire EMS runs to the High School. Reports for criminal damage to the High School property, criminal mischief to a teacher's residence, and telephone harassment of a teacher were also taken.

The SRO attends the majority of the disciplinary meetings at the Maumee High School. This provides insight and behavioral recommendations at the discretion of the school administrators. The SRO also meets with school administrators, counselors, the In-School Reassignment (ISR) Supervisor, and students on a daily basis.

During the 2016 school year the SRO assisted with three A.L.I.C.E drills performed at the Maumee High School with teachers and staff. A.L.I.C.E drills consisted of a 'working lockdown' due to an unauthorized person attempting to gain entry, a building wide lockdown, and one table top discussion about best practices were completed.

The enforcement of truancy within the district was implemented. This new function now allows the SRO to work with school administration to assist in getting students back to school or finding alternate learning settings for them. The SRO visited seventeen students' homes with Assistant Principal Scott Perrotte for truancy issues. The SRO filed charges on one parent for contributing to the delinquency of a minor for that student's habitual truancy.



The SRO has been able to assist elementary school principals in situations ranging from consultations with students, safety/security issues and investigations of criminal complaints, parking complaints, and parent complaints.

The SRO has become an important resource for school administration, staff, and the students of the district. The visibility created by the SRO and the positive interaction with the staff and students of the district has continued to create a positive image of the Maumee Police Department. The SRO position has also continued to be a great tool in gathering information about criminal activity within the City of Maumee.



Gateway Middle School Resource Officer:

The goal of the Gateway Middle School S.R.O is to develop positive student and staff relationships to facilitate open communication regarding any criminal activity or behavior that would endanger the students or staff. The relationships and trust built between the officer and students has been instrumental in identifying problems that could lead to a school or student safety concern.

Throughout the year, the Gateway Middle School School Resource Officer provided student and staff instruction on response to active threats. The Gateway Middle School S.R.O. spent time in the classrooms, teaching lessons on internet safety, refusal skills and forensic science. When violations of the law occurred within the school, the individual incidents were investigated and referrals were made to the appropriate agencies. The school resource officer works closely with the school counselors and assists in identifying and responding to mental health concerns when they pose a risk to the student's safety.



Crime Prevention

Beginning in 2015, the school resource officers began investigating school truancy offenses. This resulted in several mediation cases and improved attendance by students who had been previously chronically truant. During the 2016 academic year, a substantial reduction in truancy was noted over previous years, perhaps as a result of the SRO interventions during the 2105 and 2016 school year.

During 2016, the Gateway Middle School Resource Officer gave Gateway Middle School, Ft. Miami Elementary and Fairfield Elementary instruction in the A.L.I.C.E (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) program. State mandated safety drills were conducted at all of the schools.

When the schools were not in session, "Run, Hide, Fight" active threat training was given to the William Vaughn Company and at the Employers Association, at their requests.

The middle school resource officer helped instruct at the two-week long Maumee Safety City Program. For the remainder of the summer, when school was not in session, the SRO conducted traffic enforcement, making forty-eight traffic stops and issuing twenty-nine traffic citations.






Motor Vehicle Crash Reports Taken by Day of Week






Citations by Age 2841 Total Citations Issued








