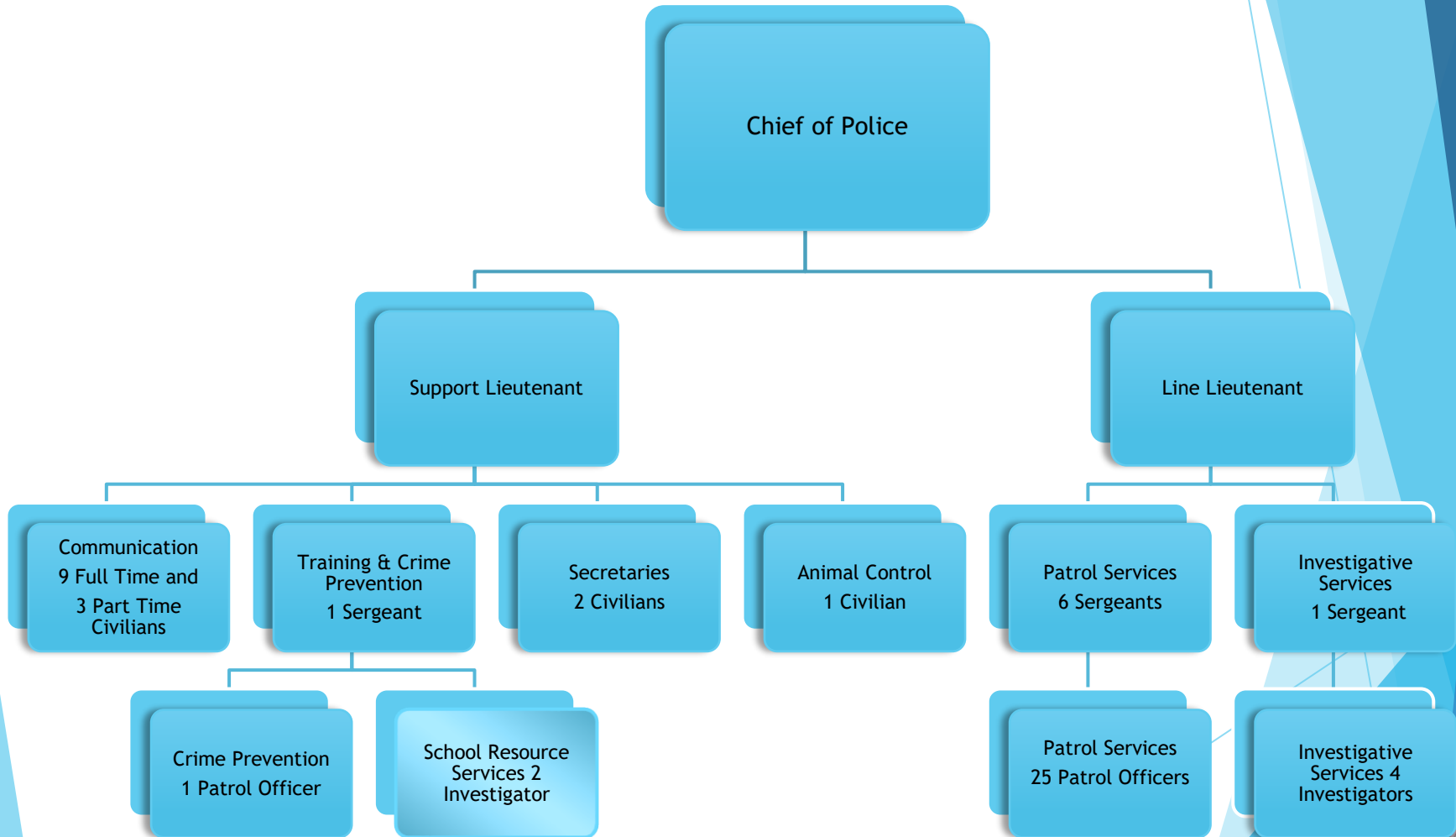

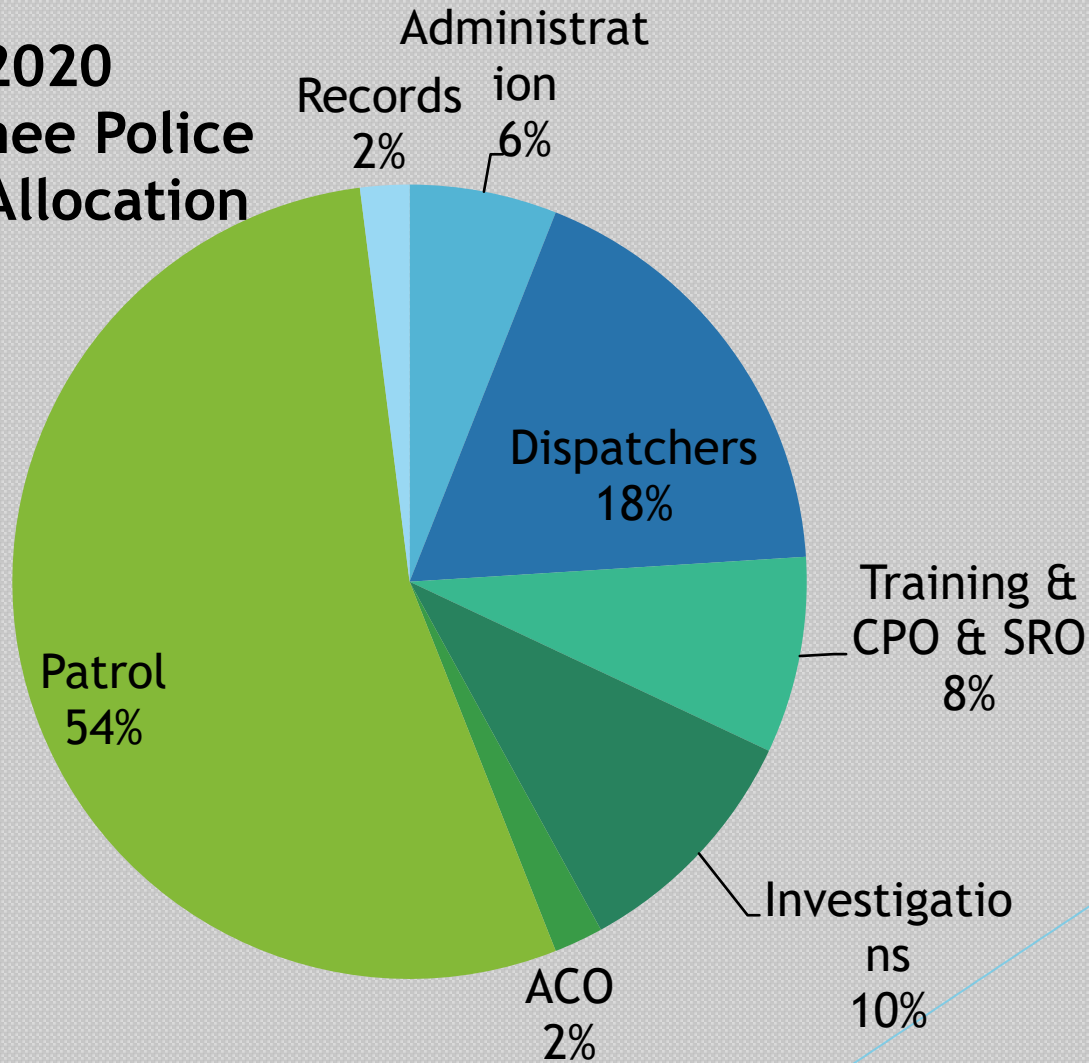

SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

Maumee Police continue to staff a school resource officer at the Maumee High School and another officer at Gateway Middle School. The school resource officer assists with school discipline, truancy issues and campus security. In addition, the officer builds relationships with the students, educators, administration and provides various topical lessons in the classroom.

BUSINESS VISITS

The Maumee Police Chief along with the Maumee Fire Chief and Safety Director made weekly community visits to citywide small business and large corporations. It proved valuable to develop relationships and foster a networking environment with the Maumee business community.

SPEED DETECTION TRAILER

The Maumee Police Division utilizes two mobile speed detection trailers throughout our city limits. The devices are primarily an awareness tool for the motoring public to observe their vehicle speed in comparison to the posted limit. The speed devices were deployed for 360 days each, for a total of 8640 hours.

Year in review

MPD OVI Arrests:

The Police Division made 98 OVI arrests during 2020. Males comprised of 72% of the arrests. Females comprised 28% of the arrests. 33% refused a breath/urine/blood test, while 67% submitted to the requested chemical test. 78% were the result of a traffic stop, and 22% of the arrests involved a crash.

Lucas County OVI Task Force:

The City of Maumee received \$7,383.16 of federal grant funding for the police departments participation in the Lucas County OVITF during 2020. The grant includes repayment of direct labor costs, fringe benefits and transportation/fuel costs. Officers worked 124.75 hours of traffic enforcement. Making 155 traffic stops and issuing 46 traffic citations. Due to the Covid-19 pandemic officers did not participate for the months of April & May.

Internships:

The Maumee Police Division facilitated two college internships for area students. The internships provided by MPD allowed the students to observe firsthand all that police work encompasses. The students rotated between the Road Patrol, Detective Bureau, School Resource Officers, DARE/Crime Prevention and shadowed the SRU team. Students were also provided the opportunity to take part in departmental training.

CRIME PREVENTION SPECIALIST

CRIME PREVENTION SPECIALIST

The Maumee Police Division maintains two officers certified as Crime Prevention Specialists. These officers maintain their certification by attending continuing education classes.

THE “ARE YOU OK?” PROGRAM

For thirty-one years, the Maumee Police Division has operated the “Are You O.K.?” program. Known as R.U.O.K., the program continues to check the safety of our senior citizens as well as our hotel night clerks and gas station attendants. Each participant receives a daily or nightly call checking on his/her safety. A police crew is sent to check their safety if the call goes unanswered.

The program has helped many residents since its inception. The program then expanded to check the safety of 24-hour gas station employees and hotel desk clerks. The program currently has seventeen individual subscribers, along with ten hotels and two gas stations.

Further, in 2016, a new program for Senior Citizens called the “Senior Outreach” program was created. This program involves a weekly in-person check (in the home) by a uniformed officer to ensure the needs of the senior are being met. There are currently five senior residents receiving an official weekly visit. In addition, contact has been made with numerous other seniors in the community to offer our services, give referral sources and to provide them a trustworthy link to the police division (if ever needed).

During the pandemic (March to December 2020), the weekly in-person visits were adjusted to a telephone call due to the risk of the looming virus. There were additional telephone calls (made by an officer) to check on those Senior Citizens who are a part of the computer-generated RUOK program along with any other Seniors that came to mind. Many were connected to the meal delivery program through the “Maumee Senior Center”, linked to other resources through the “Area Office on Aging” and assisted in picking up necessary groceries and other supplies.

CHILD SAFETY SEAT CHECKS

The Maumee Police Division has three officers that are certified technicians in child passenger restraints. They are certified through the Safe Kids Coalition Child Passenger Safety Training Program. This training enables the Maumee Police Division to provide our community with highly trained experts in the proper installation and implementation of child car seats for the safety of their children. In 2020, eight child safety seat checks (in person) were performed for citizens working or living within the City of Maumee. Many others were given personal instruction over the telephone due to the pandemic.

SEATBELT SAFETY

The Crime Prevention Officer normally teaches the “Third Grade Safety Belt Program” to all third-grade students in the Maumee School District during the Spring season. The program encompasses the proper use of seat belts, statistics about accidents/seatbelt usage, and information on air bags. Each child receives material and information to share with their family members. As part of the program, each student is deputized as Seat Belt Deputies as they pledge to wear their seatbelts and to remind family members to wear their seatbelts as well. Unfortunately, the program was cancelled due to the end of the year school shut-down.

SAFETY CITY

With great regret, the City of Maumee Safety City program 2020 had to cancel its 41st year of the program. The summer program helps to prepare four and five year olds to safely attend Kindergarten.

Safety City consists of classroom instruction, crafts, songs, and practical exercises in vehicle and pedestrian safety. Lessons are conducted on our miniature Safety City equipped with streets, crosswalks, traffic signals, railroad tracks, and faux buildings. New buildings were constructed in 2020 to replace the ones that were extremely worn by weather and will be put to good use in Safety City 2021.

Safety City is held at Wayne Trail Elementary School and consists of two sessions per day over a two-week period generally in the month of June. Each session lasts 2-1/2 hours per day.

The staff includes Maumee police officers, two teachers, a Maumee police dispatcher and numerous student volunteers to keep the program running smoothly.

The Maumee Police Division and the Maumee Board of Education both sponsor the Safety City program.

The Maumee Municipal Court supports the program through donated products. St. Luke's Hospital Ladies Auxiliary provides each graduate of Maumee Safety City with a bicycle safety helmet.

They also receive a T-shirt from the Maumee Police Division.

THE D.A.R.E. PROGRAM

The DARE program provides the students with the tools necessary to make the right decisions when it comes to alcohol, tobacco, other drugs, and violence. It is taught at Wayne Trail Elementary School, Gateway Middle School, and St. Joseph's Maumee School. The DARE program was taught to three-hundred and sixty-nine students in the fifth and seventh grades this year.

The fifth grade program culminated with one graduation ceremony (at St. Joseph's Maumee) prior to the pandemic & the distribution of T-shirts and certificates for the Wayne Trail students at their scheduled school supply pick-up/drop-off day.

Charlie's Dodge continues to kindly provide the Maumee DARE program with a donated vehicle with graphics. The Jeep Cherokee (green) was changed out for a 2019 Jeep Compass Renegade (black) in November 2019 with eye-catching new graphics that include the Maumee panther.

The Maumee Police Division received a grant for the 2019-2020 school year from the Ohio Attorney General's Office. The requested amount of **\$16,966.95** was *reduced*, across the state, by 1/3 and awarded in the amount of **\$11,028.52** to our district. These funds help to defer the cost of teaching the DARE program in the Maumee school system.

BIKE SAFETY

Bike safety/education is an important part of the Maumee crime prevention program. A bike rodeo was planned for May 2020 at Fairfield Park but was cancelled due to the pandemic. The rodeo normally starts with volunteers from TAB (Toledo Area Bicyclists) assisting the crime prevention staff by inspecting each bike, conducting safety checks and making repair recommendations. Next, cyclists receive a free bike helmet (if needed) and participate in an agility course to test their skills with the assistance of the Maumee Police Division Bicycle Officers. Finally, the Citizen's Police Academy graduates assist in many other aspects of the rodeo including passing out safety packets to all who attend.

If possible, another "Bike Rodeo" will be planned for the Spring of 2021.

The Maumee Police Division continues to provide bike licenses free of charge. These can be obtained at the Maumee police station. Found bicycles are held by the Maumee police Division at a storage unit until an owner can be located. A licensed bike enables an owner to be identified quickly and the bike returned when found or recovered.

COMMUNITY WATCH MAP

In 2017, a “Community Watch Map” was created to keep residents informed of police-related calls in our city. The Google Map can be accessed through the City of Maumee’s main website. The map shows a visual icon indicating the general area where the police call was handled including but not limited to: thefts, burglaries, assaults, criminal damage calls, drug-related calls, OVI’s, accidents and much more. When clicking on the icon, there is a brief synopsis of the call along with the date the call was taken and a report number. Residents are encouraged to utilize the map to stay informed and possibly provide any leads to help our department follow-up on unsolved crime. Further, officers are encouraged to use the map to identify crime trends and traffic issues in order to better focus their patrol efforts.

This was the 18th year for the School Resource Officer (SRO) Program in the City of Maumee. Officer Scott Russell worked as the primary SRO for Maumee High School. Officer Russell assisted SRO Loren Boos, and Derek Sanderson at Gateway Middle School.

SRO Russell responded to 18 calls for service during the 2020 school year and attended 37 truancy intervention meetings as part of the school's attendance intervention team. Officer Russell also received three investigations from the road patrol and detective bureau for possible follow-up. Officer Russell documented incidents of Maumee students in mental crisis and assisted on Maumee Fire EMS runs to the High School.

SRO Russell provides insight and behavioral recommendations at the discretion of the school administrators. The SRO also meets with school administrators, counselors, the In-School Reassignment (ISR) Supervisor, and students on a daily basis.

During the 2020 school year SRO Russell assisted with A.L.I.C.E drills performed at the Maumee High School, Wayne Trail Elementary school, and Union Pre-School with teachers and staff. Those A.L.I.C.E drills included building evacuations due to a perceived interior threat, lockdown and secure in place due to an external issue, and table top discussions on school safety where Officer Russell discussed several topics on school safety.

The use of the SRO to enforce truancy within the district allows the SRO to work with school administration to assist in getting students back to school or finding alternate learning settings for them.

SRO Russell has been able to assist elementary school principals in situations ranging from consultations with students, safety/security issues and investigations of criminal complaints, parking complaints, and parent complaints.

The SRO has become an important resource for school administration, staff, and the students of the district. The visibility created by the SRO and the positive interaction with the staff and students of the district has continued to create a positive image of the Maumee Police Department. The SRO position has also continued to be a great tool in gathering information about criminal activity within the City of Maumee.

Gateway Middle School Resource Officer:

The goal of the Gateway Middle School S.R.O is to develop positive student and staff relationships to facilitate open communication regarding any criminal activity or behavior that would endanger the students or staff. The relationships and trust built between the officer and students has been instrumental in identifying problems that could lead to a school or student safety concern.

Throughout the year, the Gateway Middle School School Resource Officer provided student and staff instruction in response to active threats. The Gateway Middle School S.R.O. spent time in the classrooms, teaching lessons on internet safety, refusal skills and forensic science. When violations of the law occurred within the school, the individual incidents were investigated and referrals were made to the appropriate agencies. The school resource officer works closely with the school counselors and assists in identifying and responding to mental health concerns when they pose a risk to the student's safety.

Starting in August of the 2017-2018 school year, Gateway Middle School was assigned a new SRO for the building. I, Ptl. Loren Boos, became the new SRO for the middle school. I am in my 20th year with the Maumee Police Division, and prior to the Maumee Police Division I have worked for BGSU Police Department and Bettsville PD. Over my 20 years with the division, I have filled many rolls with the division such as: SRU (Special Response Unit) for 18 years, FTO (Field Training Officer) for 11 years, property room officer, bike patrol officer, Detective & Firearms Instructor.

As the SRO, I have transitioned some of the drills we perform in the schools from going through the motions to ramping the drills up to make them more realistic so that the students and staff are more prepared in case of a critical incident. I have not only done this in the middle school but the two elementary schools that I am also responsible for, Fairfield Elementary and Fort Miami Elementary. All the students and staffs in all the buildings are adapting well and are learning what to do and not to do during a critical incident.

During 2020, the Gateway Middle School Resource Officer gave Gateway Middle School, Ft. Miami Elementary and Fairfield Elementary instruction in the A.L.I.C.E (Alert, Lockdown, Inform, Counter, Evacuate) program. State mandated safety drills were conducted at all of the Schools.

Due to COVID 19 protocols, schools for the most part during the last half of school year and the first portion of school year after summer, 2020 were not in session, inperson. As the schools were not in physical session, no SRO's were needed to be present, in schools, during those times. During this time, I was reassigned to the road as a patrol officer from March of 2020 until physical school sessions came back in, in mid September 2020.

The Maumee Police Division continues the tradition of training our officers to be the very best in the area through a plethora of training opportunities.

The Maumee Police Division had a decrease in training hours due to the Covid-19 pandemic. We were able to establish new connections with country wide training organizations who will be conducting future training at our facilities.

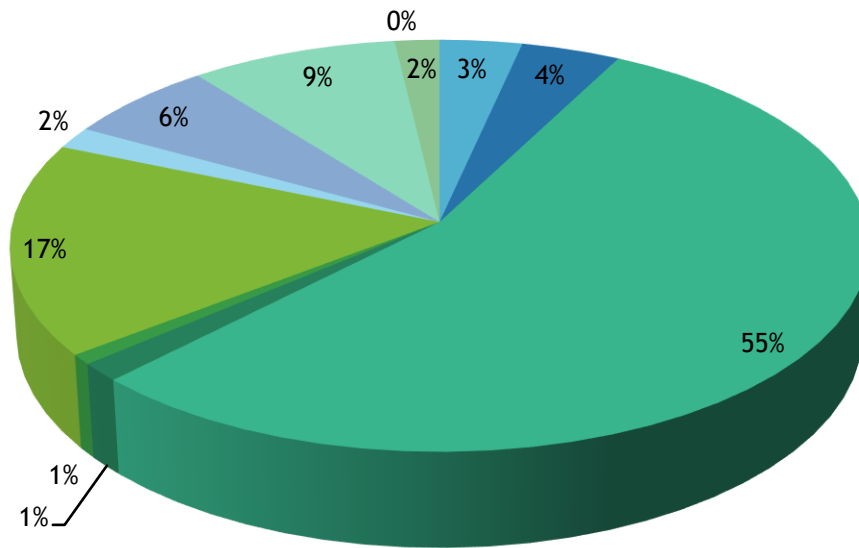
Training

1. 2020 had a decrease in the total hours of training department wide with a decrease of approximately 4,800 hours.
2. In 2020, the police division used our three Covid-19 officers to educate businesses and disseminate department of health information regarding the pandemic.
3. In 2020, the police department added a part time dispatcher.
4. Even with the decrease in departmental training, the police division trained officers in (CIT) crisis intervention. The police division added two new scenario-based training instructors to the training staff.
5. The entire patrol staff participated in annual Use of Force training held at the Police Department.
6. In 2020, The Maumee Police Division began implementing Lexipol for our policies and procedures.
7. Officers received practical force on force training, using Simunition gear and equipment. This training puts officers through real life scenarios in which they interact with human actors. The police division also conducted MILO (Multiple Interactive Learning Objectives) training focusing on de-escalation and use of force scenarios.
8. We held several firearms qualifications in multiple weapon platforms.
9. Watchguard body cameras were purchased and are in the process of being implemented.

Investigations

MAJOR INVESTIGATIONS

Rape

There were four (4) reported cases of rape investigated by the detective bureau. Prosecution was denied on one (1) case. One (1) case was closed by referral, and one (1) case was determined to be unfounded. One (1) case is currently under investigation.

Sexual Assault/Sex Offenses

There were five (5) sexual assault/offense cases investigated by the detective bureau. Two (2) cases were determined to be unfounded. One (1) case was closed due to all investigative leads were exhausted and the two (2) cases were closed due to the victim refusing to cooperate with the investigation.

Missing Persons

Two (2) missing person cases were investigated by the detective bureau, one involving a juvenile. Both were located and no foul play was involved.

Robbery

There were four (4) robberies investigated by the detective bureau. Three (3) cases were cleared by arrest. The remaining case was closed after all leads were exhausted. No weapons were reportedly used in these offenses and no victims/employees suffered any physical harm.



Investigations

Aggravated Robbery

One (1) aggravated robbery had occurred at a financial institution and was investigated the detective bureau. On the same date that the offense occurred, the lone suspect was identified and arrested. Shortly thereafter, nearly all of the stolen money had been recovered.

Residential Burglary

Five (5) residential burglary cases were assigned to the detective bureau for further investigation. One (1) was cleared by arrest and one (1) case was determined to be unfounded. The remaining three (3) are under investigation.

Breaking and Entering

Six (6) past offense breaking and entering cases were investigated by the detective bureau. Four (4) cases were closed after all investigative leads were exhausted. The remaining two (2) cases were closed due to a lack of evidence/leads.

Death/Suicide

Twenty (20) deaths were investigated. None of these cases were determined to be the result of homicide.

Theft/Fraud/Forgery

One hundred forty-nine (149) theft cases were assigned to the detective bureau for investigation. Of these, forty-nine (49) cases were cleared by arrest/exceptional means. Seventy-four (74) cases were closed due to either a lack of investigative leads, exhaustion of investigative leads, or referred to another agency due to jurisdiction/venue. Three (3) cases were determined to be unfounded, and the victim refused to cooperate in one (1) case. Prosecution was denied on one (1) case and twenty-one (21) are currently under investigation.

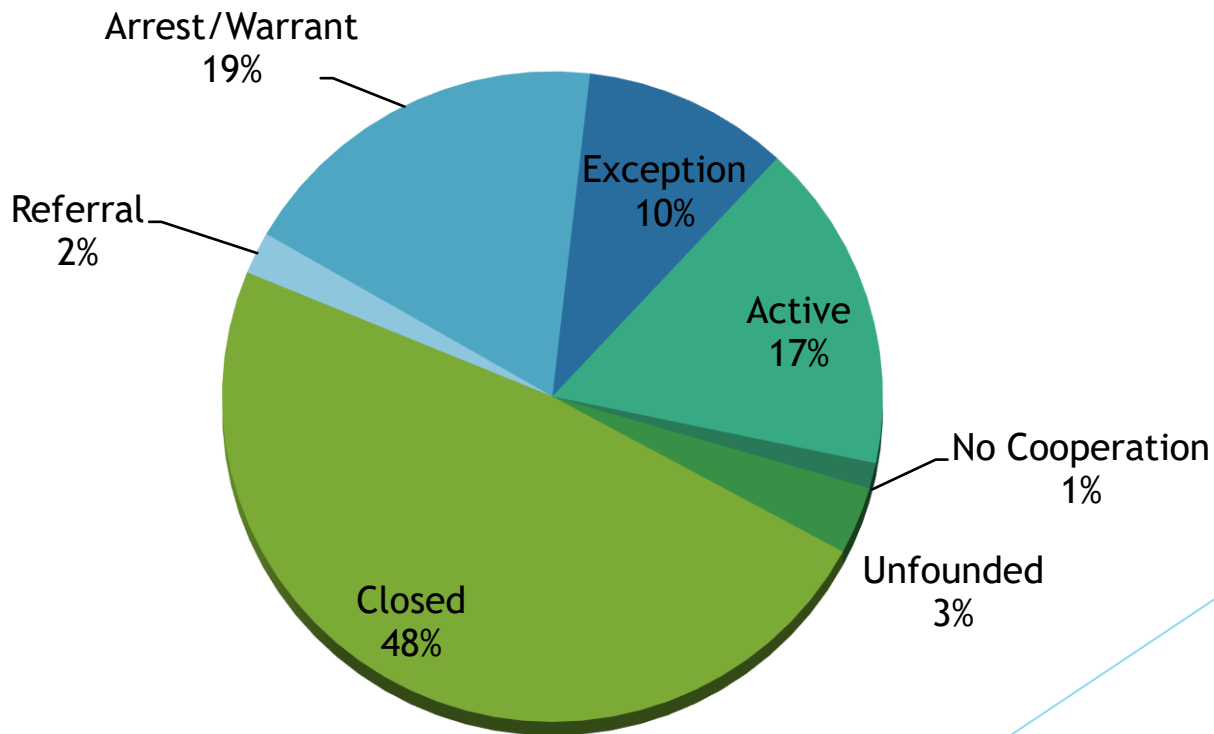
Summary

In 2020 the detective bureau investigated a total of 238 offenses that were reported to have occurred in the City of Maumee. This was an unusual decrease of approximately 25% from 2019. It is speculated that the COVID-19 pandemic was likely a contributing factor of the overall crime reported. Of those cases investigated, 39 remain under investigation. Of the remaining 199 closed cases, 73 were cleared by arrest or exceptional means (36.6%). 106 were closed due to the lack of, or exhaustion of investigative leads (53%). There were five (5) cases closed by referral to another law enforcement agency (2.5%). Eight (8) cases were determined to be unfounded (4%). The remaining cases were closed due to the victim failing to cooperate, the death of the offender, or prosecution being declined. The majority of cases assigned to the detective bureau were theft related offenses (149), which totaled 62.6% of all criminal investigations for the year.

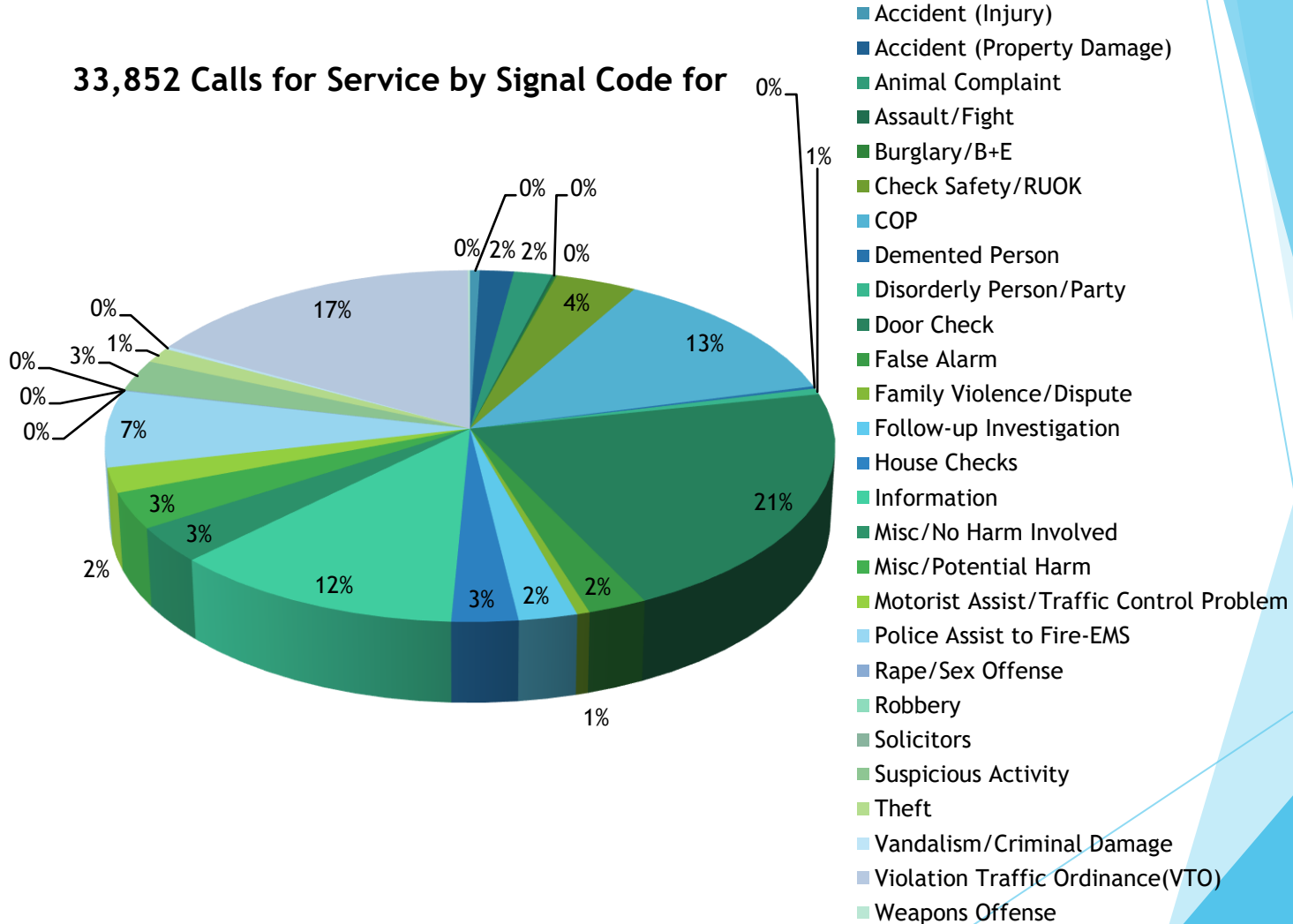

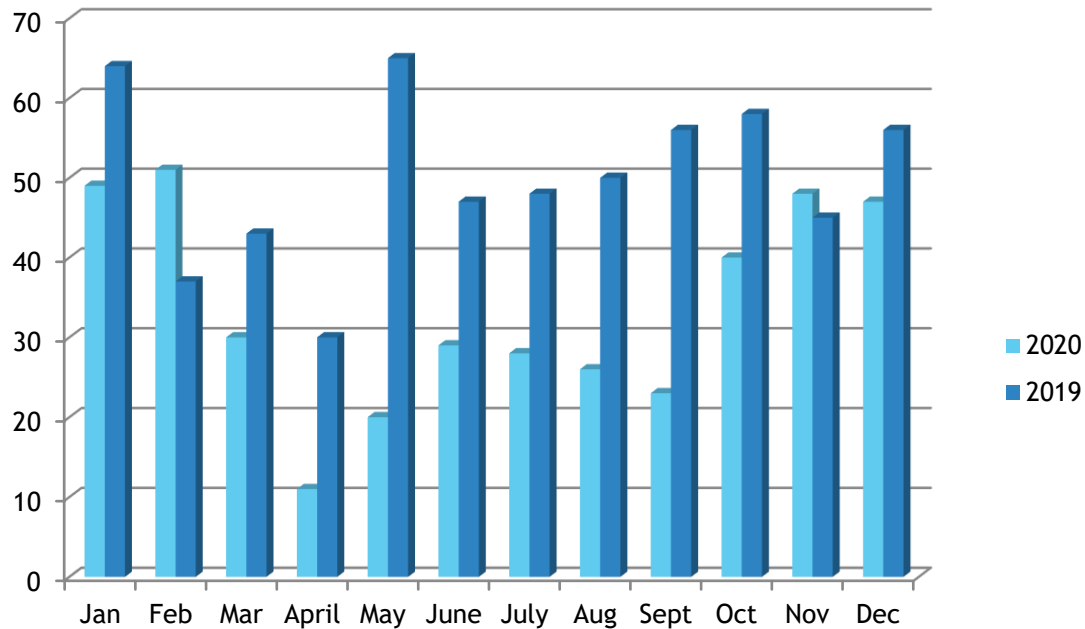

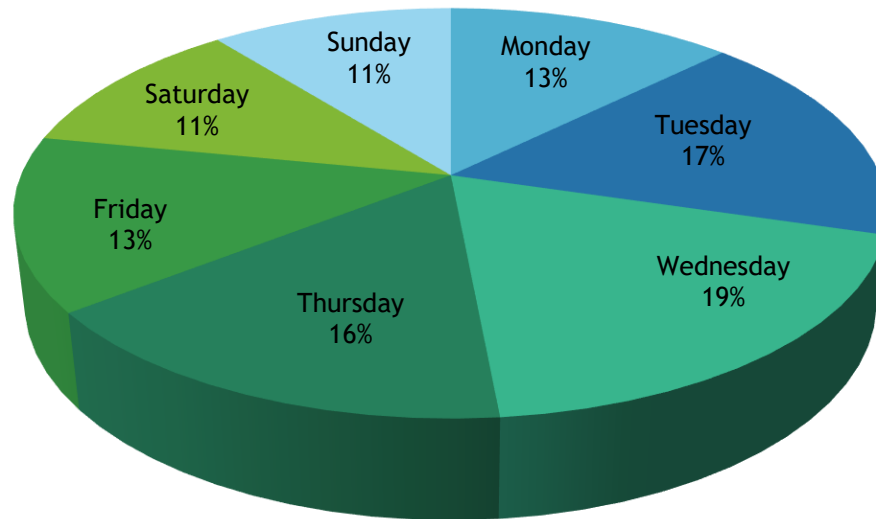

Motor Vehicle Crash Reports Taken by Day of Week

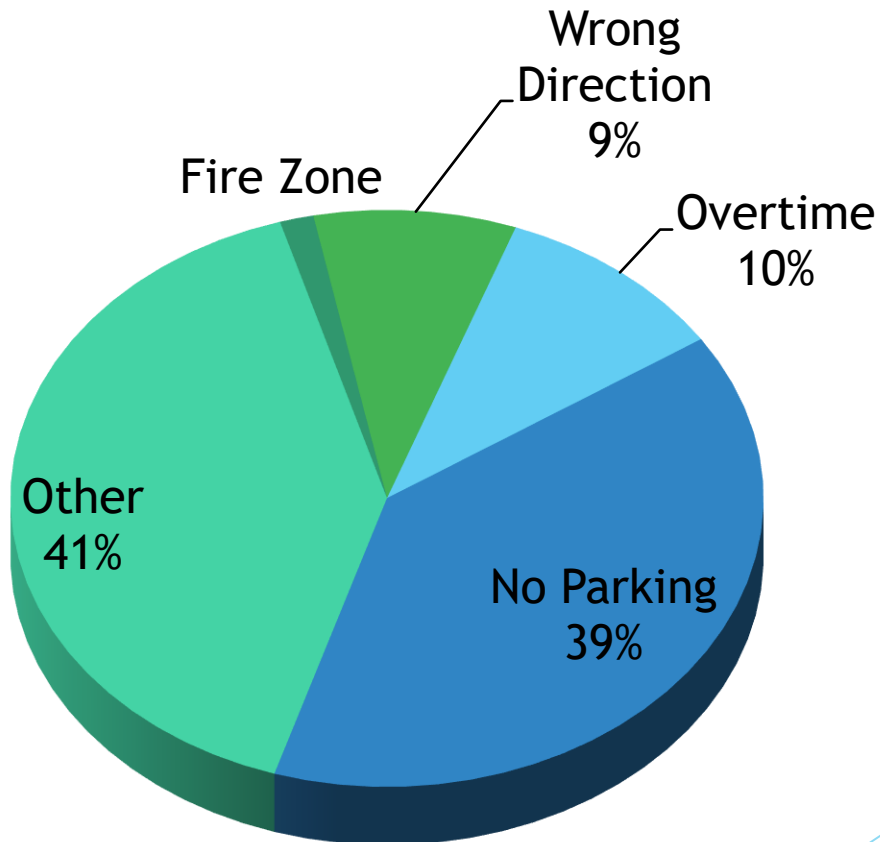

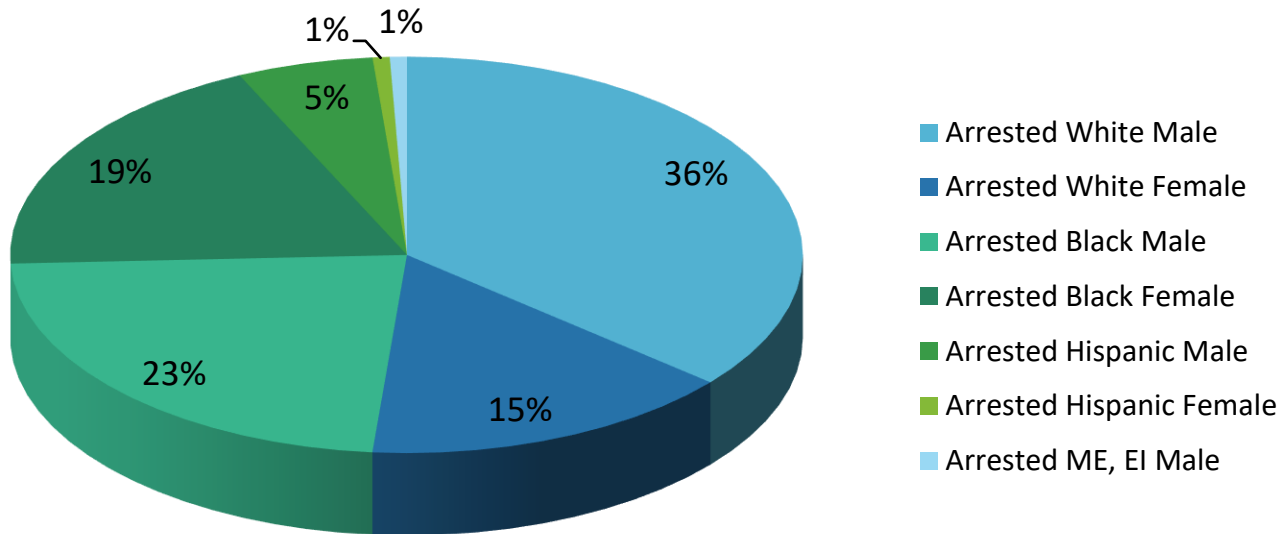
Citations by Age 1599 Total Citations Issued

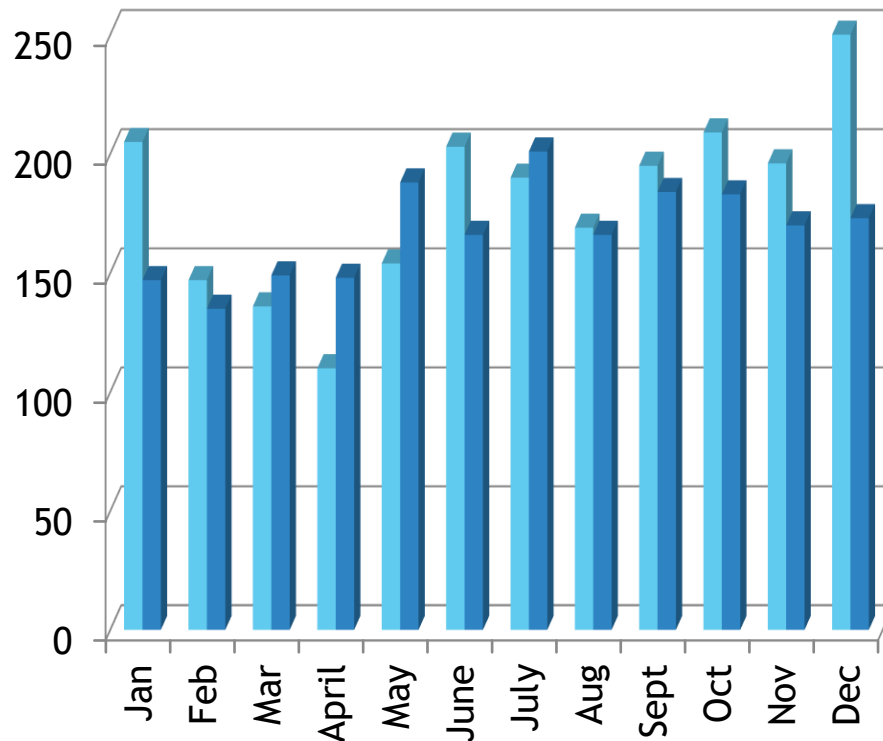

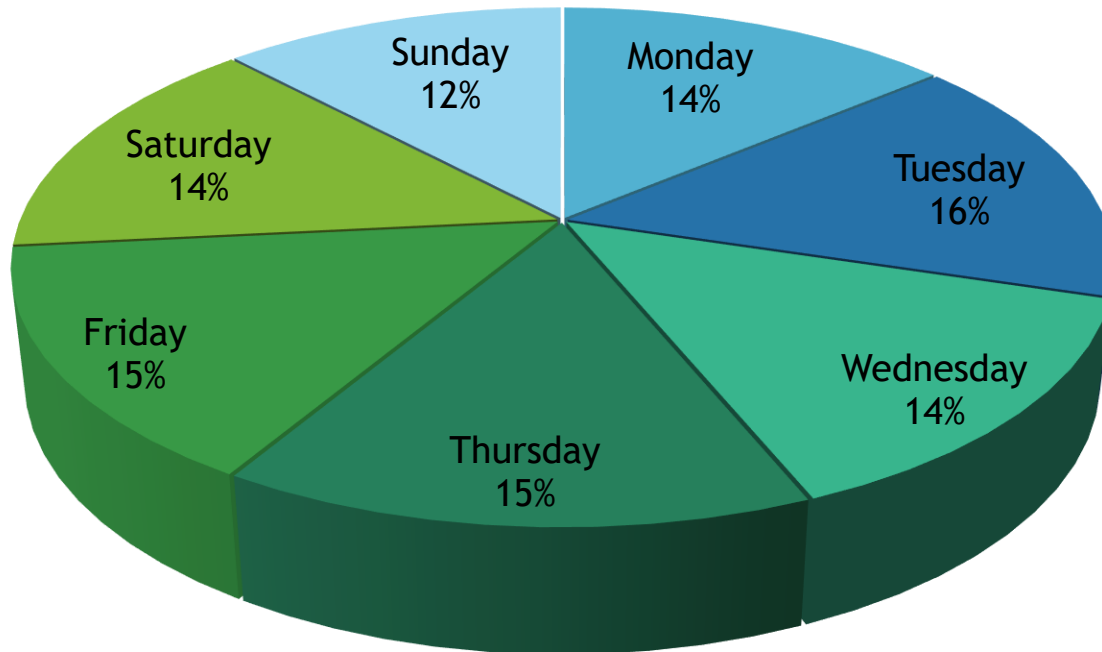

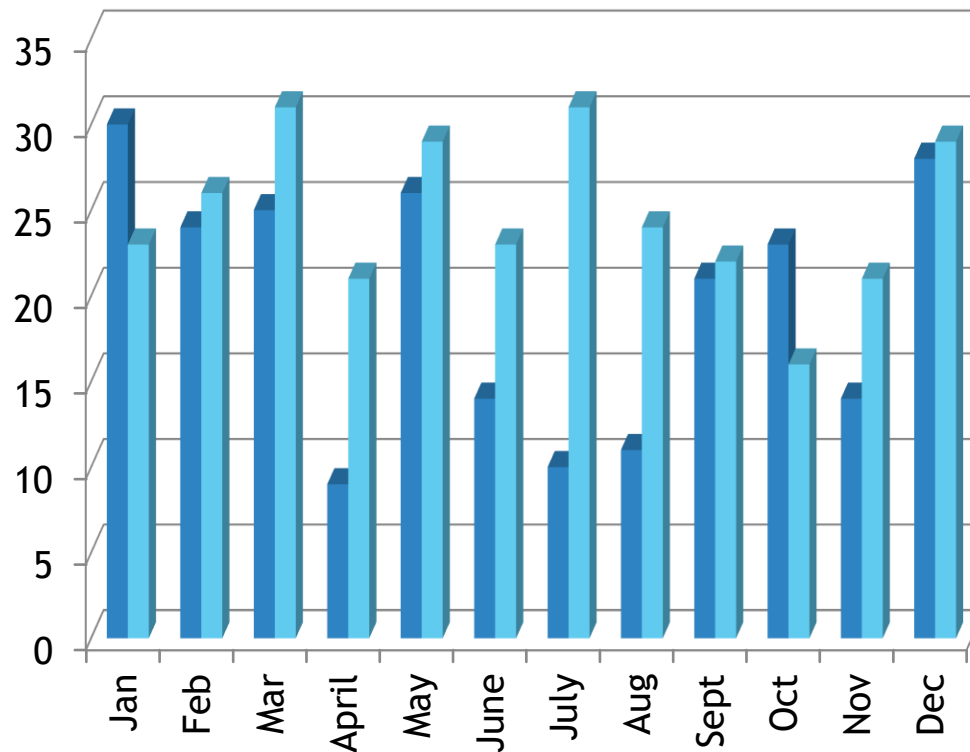

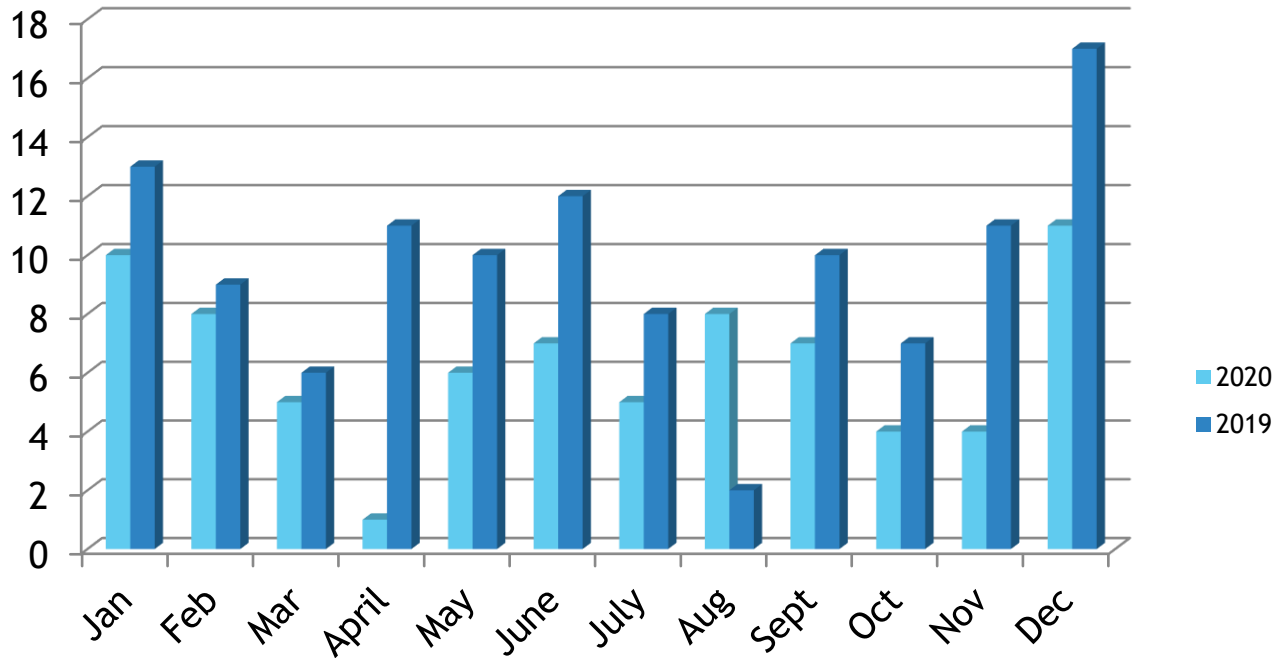

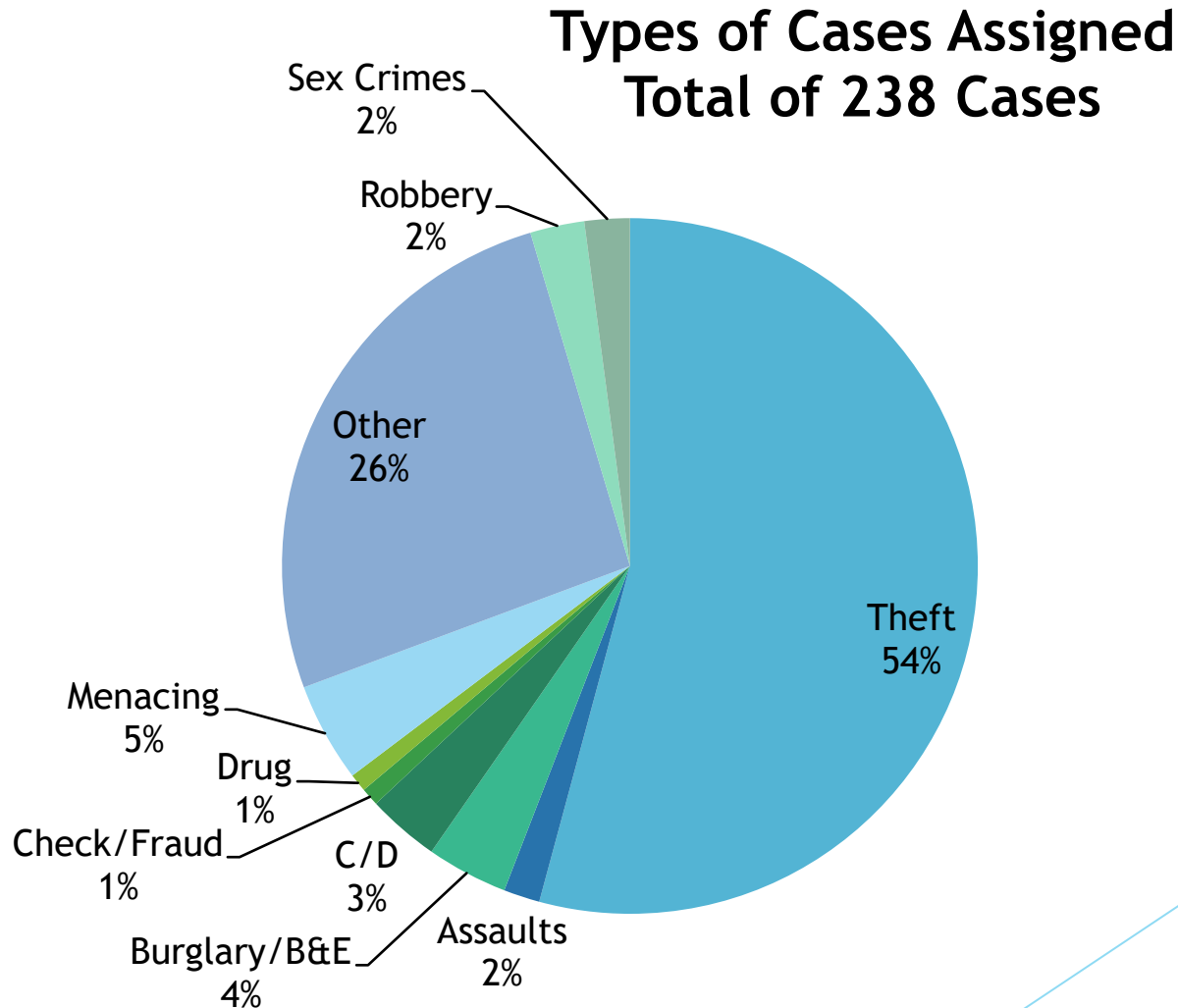
