



SCHOOL RESOURCE OFFICER

Maumee Police continue to staff a school resource officer at the Maumee High School and another officer at Gateway Middle School. The school resource officer assists with school discipline, truancy issues and campus security. In addition, the officer builds relationships with the students, educators, administration and provides various topical lessons in the classroom.



Speed Detection Trailer

The Maumee Police Division utilizes two mobile speed detection trailers throughout our city limits. The devices are primarily an awareness tool for the motoring public to observe their vehicle speed in comparison to the posted limit. The speed devices were deployed for 241 days each, for a total of 5775 hours.

Citizens Police Academy

There was no Citizens Police Academy in 2021 due to Covid-19 concerns.

CRIME PREVENTION SPECIALIST

The Maumee Police Division maintains one officer certified as a Crime Prevention Specialist. This officer maintains their certification by attending continuing education classes.

THE "ARE YOU OK?" PROGRAM

For thirty-two years, the Maumee Police Division has operated the "Are You O.K.?" program. Known as R.U.O.K., the program continues to check the safety of our senior citizens as well as our hotel night clerks and gas station attendants. Each participant receives a daily or nightly call checking on his/her safety. A police crew is sent to check their safety if the call goes unanswered.

The program has helped many residents since its inception. The program then expanded to check the safety of 24-hour gas station employees and hotel desk clerks.

In October, due to losing our dispatch center (who monitored these automated daily calls) our seniors were switched over to a state program called 'Staying Connected', which is run by the Ohio Department of Aging. This program provides the senior with a daily phone call and if that call goes unanswered, the local law enforcement agency will be contacted to check on this senior. Unfortunately, we had no alternative for the 24-hour gas station and midnight hotel clerks, so we have our officers making a point to check on these businesses and employees in person as often as possible.

SENIOR OUTREACH PROGRAM

Further, in 2016, a new program for Senior Citizens called the "Senior Outreach" program was created. This program involves a weekly in-person check (in the home) by a uniformed officer to ensure the needs of the senior are being met. There are currently six senior residents receiving an official weekly visit. In addition, contact has been made with numerous other seniors in the community to offer our services, give referral resources and to provide them a trustworthy link to the police division (if ever needed).

Due to the pandemic, when vaccines became available to seniors in February 2021, the Community Service Officer called every senior in our programs and was able to register 19 seniors for their vaccine, even assisting with transporting some of them to their appointment at the Lucas County Rec. Center. This greatly assisted the seniors who don't have internet and/or who are not tech savvy in registering online.

CHILD SAFETY SEAT CHECKS

The Maumee Police Division has two officers that are certified technicians in child passenger restraints. They are certified through the Safe Kids Coalition Child Passenger Safety Training Program. This training enables the Maumee Police Division to provide our community with highly trained technicians in the proper installation and implementation of child car seats for the safety of their children. In 2021, four child safety seat checks (in person) were performed for citizens. Many others were given instruction over the telephone due to the pandemic.



SEATBELT SAFETY

The Community Service Officer taught the "Third Grade Safety Belt Program" to all third-grade students (194) in the Maumee School District in April 2021. The program encompasses the proper use of seat belts, statistics about accidents/seatbelt usage, and information on air bags. Each child receives material and information to share with their family members. As part of the program, each student is deputized as Seat Belt Deputies as they pledge to wear their seatbelts and to remind family members to wear their seatbelts as well.



SAFETY CITY

The City of Maumee Safety City program 2021 held its 41st year of the program June 14-25, 2021, with 109 kids participating. The summer program helps to prepare four- and five-year-olds to safely attend Kindergarten.

Safety City consists of classroom instruction, crafts, songs, and practical exercises in vehicle and pedestrian safety. Lessons are conducted on our miniature Safety City equipped with streets, crosswalks, traffic signals, railroad tracks, and faux buildings. The New buildings were a hit, and we greatly appreciated all the work that the Maumee Service Division put into constructing them.

Safety City is held at Wayne Trail Elementary School and consists of two sessions per day over a two-week period generally in the month of June. Each session lasts 2-1/2 hours per day.

The staff includes Maumee police officers, two Maumee City School teachers, and numerous student volunteers to keep the program running smoothly.

The Maumee Police Division and the Maumee Board of Education both sponsor the Safety City program.

The Maumee Municipal Court supports the program through donated products. St. Luke's Hospital Auxiliary provides each graduate of Maumee Safety City with a bicycle safety helmet. Gallon, Takacs, & Boissoneault Law Firm donated to this program that provided each child with a bike reflector light and mini first aid kid as well. They also receive a T-shirt from the Maumee Police Division.



THE D.A.R.E. PROGRAM IS NOW L.E.A.D.

The D.A.R.E. program was taught to 171 fifth graders and 66 seventh graders (second semester) between February and May 2021 by the Maumee Community Service Officer.

After researching alternative Drug Abuse Prevention Programs over the summer months, the Maumee Police Division, with the support of the Maumee City School Board, switched from D.A.R.E. (Drug Abuse Resistance Education) to L.E.A.D. (Law Enforcement Against Drugs). L.E.A.D. was found to not only be more interactive with the students, but also a tested, proven, and effective, evidence-based program that aligns with many academic and health education standards.

Two officers became certified L.E.A.D. instructors over the summer months, with a third officer becoming certified in December of this year.

The L.E.A.D. program provides the students with the tools necessary to make the right decisions when it comes to alcohol, tobacco, other drugs, and violence. It is taught at Wayne Trail Elementary School, Gateway Middle School, and St. Joseph's Maumee School. The L.E.A.D. program was taught to 200 fifth graders and 81 seventh graders this year between September and December 2021.

The fifth-grade programs culminated with the distribution of T-shirts and certificates to all fifth graders.

Charlie's Dodge continues to kindly sponsor the Maumee Police Division's drug abuse prevention program with a donated vehicle with graphics. A 2019 Jeep Compass Renegade (black) was loaned to the Division in November 2019 with eye-catching new graphics that include the Maumee panther. At the conclusion of 2021, the final stages of changing out this vehicle to a Truck with L.E.A.D. graphics were ongoing.

The Maumee Police Division received a grant for the <u>2020-21</u> school year from the Ohio Attorney General's Office in the amount of \$13,396.67. These funds help to defer the cost of teaching the drug abuse prevention programs in the Maumee school system.

COMMUNITY WATCH MAP

In 2017, a "Community Watch Map" was created to keep residents informed of police-related calls in our city. The Google Map can be accessed through the City of Maumee's main website. The map shows a visual icon indicating the general area where the police call was handled including but not limited to: thefts, burglaries, assaults, criminal damage calls, drug-related calls, OVI's, accidents and much more. When clicking on the icon, there is a brief synopsis of the call along with the date the call was taken and a report number. Residents are encouraged to utilize the map to stay informed and possibly provide any leads to help our department follow-up on unsolved crime. Further, officers are encouraged to use the map to identity crime trends and traffic issues in order to better focus their. patrol efforts.



BIKE SAFETY

Bike safety/education is an important part of the Maumee crime prevention program. A bike rodeo was held in September 2021 after having to cancel a spring one due to the pandemic. The rodeo starts with volunteers from Maumee Citizen's Police Academy and Maumee High School registering the children and issuing a bike license for each bike. TAB (Toledo Area Bicyclists) assisted by inspecting each bike, conducting safety checks and making repair recommendations. Next, cyclists receive a free bike helmet (if needed) which are fitted properly by volunteers from Safe Kids. Lastly they participate in an agility course to test their skills with the assistance of the Maumee Police Division Bicycle Officers.

The Maumee Police Division continues to provide bike licenses free of charge. These can be obtained at the Maumee police station and enables an owner to be identified quickly and the bike returned when found or recovered.

PRESENTATIONS, TALKS & SERVICE ON BOARDS

One scout tour was conducted in May at the police station with 12 kids in attendance.

Attended several OCPA (Ohio Crime Prevention Association) regional meetings via zoom.

Participated in zoom/virtual job fairs at the University of Toledo, Bowling Green State University & Owens Community College for recruiting new officers for our division.

Crime Prevention articles were composed for the "Maumee Mirror" Spring & Fall newsletters.

Participated in a "Senior Health & Wellness Fair" at the Maumee Senior Center in September.

Partnered with the DEA, S.A.I.L., and McLaren St. Luke's Hospital for 2 Drug Take-Back events that consisted of 2 drop-off locations: McLaren St. Luke's Hospital and the Maumee police station. In April, we collected 363.4 lbs. of prescription and OTC (over the counter) pills. In October we collected 270.8 lbs. of pills.

There is also the availability of a drug drop-off box in the Maumee Police Division lobby 24/7.

Spoke to the children about child safety topics at Small Beginnings Preschool, Little Village Preschool, and Let's Be Friends Preschool.

Assisted with school safety drills

Organized "Burgers & Badges" cook-out at Library Park in August 2021 to recognize "National Night Out". This event allows citizens to interact with Maumee Police Officers and Firefighters while enjoying a meal and activities together. We had roughly 100 citizens in attendance at this event.

This was the 19th year for the School Resource Officer (SRO) Program in the City of Maumee. Officer Scott Russell worked as the primary SRO for Maumee High School. Officer Russell assisted SRO Loren Boos and SRO Cory Henson at Gateway Middle School.

SRO Russell responded to 48 calls for service during the 2021 school year. Officer Russell also received investigations from the road patrol and detective bureau for possible follow-up. Officer Russell documented incidents of a Maumee student in mental crisis and assisted on Maumee Fire EMS runs to the High School.

SRO Russell provides insight and behavioral recommendations at the discretion of the school administrators. The SRO also meets with school administrators, counselors, and students on a daily basis.

During the 2021 school year SRO Russell assisted with A.L.I.C.E drills performed at the Maumee High School, Wayne Trail Elementary school, and Union Pre-School with teachers and staff. Those A.L.I.C.E drills included building evacuations due to a perceived interior threat, lockdown and secure in place due to an external issue, and District wide safety day where Officer Henson and Officer Russell discussed several topics on school safety.

The use of the SRO to enforce truancy within the district allows the SRO to work with school administration to assist in getting students back to school or finding alternate learning settings for them. SRO Russell attended twenty-nine attendance intervention meetings during 2021 school year.

SRO Russell has been able to assist elementary school principals in situations ranging from consultations with students, safety/security issues and investigations of criminal complaints, parking complaints, and parent complaints.

The SRO has become an important resource for school administration, staff, and the students of the district. The visibility created by the SRO and the positive interaction with the staff and students of the district has continued to create a positive image of the Maumee Police Department. The SRO position has also continued to be a great tool in gathering information about criminal activity within the City of Maumee

Gateway Middle School Resource Officer:

SRO Henson started his first year as an SRO in August of 2021. In the 5 months Officer Henson was in Gateway he responded to 22 calls for service during the 2021 school year. Officer Henson also received investigations from the road patrol and detective bureau for possible follow-up. Officer Henson documented incidents of a Maumee student in mental crisis and assisted on Maumee Fire EMS runs to Gateway.

SRO Henson provides behavioral recommendations and advice at the discretion of the school administrators. The SRO also meets with school administrators, counselors, and students on a daily basis.

During the 20121 school year SRO Henson assisted with A.L.I.C.E drills performed at Gateway Middle School, Fairfield Elementary School, and Fort Miami Elementary School with teachers and staff. Those A.L.I.C.E drills included building evacuations due to a perceived interior threat, lockdown and secure in place due to an external issue, and District wide safety day where Officer Henson and Officer Russell discussed several topics on school safety. SRO Henson teaches LEAD "Law Enforcement Against Drugs" to 7th grade students at Gateway. LEAD covers topics concerning street drugs, prescription and over the counter drugs. LEAD also teaches and provides tools to help students live a successful and drug free life such as goal development, decision making and how to manage your emotions. Officer Henson also teaches a class covering internet safety and bullying to 6th and 7th graders at Gateway.



SRO Henson has assisted elementary school principals in situations ranging from behavioral issues with students, safety/security issues and investigations of criminal complaints, parking complaints, and parent complaints. SRO Henson visits the elementary schools, multiple times a week, attending recess and getting to know the students and staff. Officer Henson has been involved in activities at elementary schools, such as attending kindergarten classes to read to students.

School Resource Officers are an important part of Maumee Schools. SRO presence and visibility provides a safe learning environment for our students. School Resource Officer's build positive relationships within the Maumee School District that can be beneficial to the well-being of the community. These relationships may start as early as pre-k and can last a lifetime.



Training

The Maumee Police Division continues the tradition of training our officers to be the very best in the area through a plethora of training opportunities.

2021 the police division continued to provide area businesses with Active Shooter training free of charge. This training helps to create stronger bonds between the community businesses and police department.

In 2021 we hired 1 new Patrolman, who completed the 20-week field training program which is structured with specific training briefs for each day of training. The program is broken into three phases that has specific training categories that the probationary officer must be proficient in, before advancing to the next phase of training. At the conclusion of phase three, the probationary officer is shadowed, for two weeks, by the Field Training Officer, who only observes and offers no help or advice. This ensures that the probationary officer is ready to be on his/her own, before officially being released from the program.

The Division continued to get our newer officers trained as Crisis Intervention Officers through (CIT) training.

The entire Patrol Staff participated in annual Use of Force training held at the Police Department.

The entire Patrol Staff participated in MILO (Multiple Interactive Learning Objectives) training. MILO training is training for Law Enforcement Officers through simulated training.



Training

Officers also received force on force training which is practical training, using Simunition gear and equipment. This training puts officers through real life scenarios in which they interact with human actors.

We held several firearms qualifications in multiple weapon platforms.

Ptl. Russell began teaching "Interacting with the Police to Maumee High School students 9-12 in Health classes.

LEAD training replaced DARE and began in grades 5th and 7th grades. SRO's taught in St. Joe's, Wayne Trail and Gateway Middle School.

Three Sergeants graduated from leadership schools. Two Sergeants went through the Police Executive Leadership College (PELC) while another Sergeant attended Supervisors Training and Education (STEP).

Safety City was held this year at Wayne Trail Elementary school.

The Bike Rodeo was held at Fairfield for the children of Maumee.

Internet safety was taught at Gateway by SRO Henson to 7th grade students.

Trunk or Treat was done at multiple locations around the City to create positive interactions with young children and the Maumee Police Division.

A recruitment team was formed to reach out to area high schools, career centers, Universities/Colleges, Police Academies, and Job Fairs to market the Maumee Police Division. A Maumee Police recruitment video was also produced and shared on social media in an effort to increase awareness of when the department is hiring and show what opportunities the Maumee Police Division provides the community and it's officers.

MAJOR INVESTIGATIONS

Rape

There were five (5) reported cases of rape investigated by the detective bureau. One (1) case was cleared by arrest. Prosecution was denied on one (1) case. One (1) case was determined to be unfounded, and two (2) cases were closed due to the victim refusing to cooperate.

Sexual Assault

There were seven (7) sexual assault cases investigated by the detective bureau. One (1) case was cleared by arrest. Two (2) cases were cleared by exception due to several factors. Prosecution was denied on three (3) cases, and one (1) case is currently under investigation.

Arson

One (1) aggravated arson case was investigated which was cleared by arrest. The victim business suffered extensive damage and the suspect was also charged with assault and vandalism.

Missing Persons

Two (2) missing person cases were investigated by the detective bureau. Both cases involved adults who were located with positive outcomes.

Robbery

There were three (3) robbery cases investigated by the detective bureau. One (1) case was cleared by death of offender. The identified suspect had later committed a home invasion, outside of Maumee, which resulted in his death. The remaining two (2) cases were both cleared by arrest. One of these cases involved a recovered stolen vehicle, which was found to contain trace DNA evidence. This was crucial in the identification of two suspects in what became an extensive, multi-state investigation.

Felonious Assault

Three (3) felonious assault cases were assigned for further investigation. All three were cleared by arrest.

Residential Burglary

Three (3) residential burglary cases were assigned to the detective bureau for further investigation. One (1) was cleared by exception. The remaining two (2) were closed due to a lack of leads/leads exhausted.

Breaking and Entering

One (1) breaking and entering case was investigated by the detective bureau and was closed after all leads were exhausted.

Home

Theft

Ninety-seven (97) theft cases were assigned to the detective bureau for investigation. Of these, twenty-two (22) cases were cleared by arrest and fourteen (14) by exceptional means. Forty-six (46) cases were closed due to either a lack of investigative leads, exhaustion of investigative leads, or referred to another agency due to jurisdiction/venue. Two (2) cases were determined to be unfounded, and the victim refused to cooperate in one (1) case. Prosecution was denied on one (1) case and eleven (11) are currently under investigation.

Fraud


Eight (8) fraud cases were assigned to the detective bureau. Of these, four (4) cases were cleared. One (1) case was closed due to leads being exhausted. One (1) case was determined to be unfounded, and two (2) remain under investigation.

Summary

In 2021 the detective bureau investigated a total of 180 incidents that were reported to have occurred in the City of Maumee. Of those, eighteen remain under investigation. A total of twenty-two incidents were death investigations (non-criminal). Of the remaining 140 closed cases, fifty-six were cleared by arrest or exceptional means (40%). Sixty were closed, closed due to a lack of leads, or closed due to exhaustion of investigative leads (42.9%). There were four cases closed by referral to another law enforcement agency (2.8 %) and four determined to be unfounded (2.8 %). The remaining cases were closed due to the victim failing to cooperate, the death of the offender, or prosecution being declined (11.4%). The majority of cases assigned to the detective bureau were theft offenses (97) which totaled 53.8% of all investigations conducted for the year.



Types of Cases Assigned Total of 180 cases











Police Responses to 28,219 CFS by Day of Week






Motor Vehicle Crash Reports By Month




Motor Vehicle Crash Reports

500 Accident Records in 2021






Parking Citation Type 61 Parking Citations in 2021






